Nonparametric Statistical Methods (Third Edition)

Course Description: This course provides an introduction to applied nonparametric statistical methods for students interested in performing meaningful data analysis. While the primary focus is on nonparametric methods, students will also gain a general perspective on parametric approaches. Topics include dichotomous data problems (Binomial test), one-sample location methods (Sign test, Wilcoxon signed-rank test), two-sample location methods (Wilcoxon rank-sum test), two-sample dispersion (Ansari–Bradley test), one-way layout (Kruskal–Wallis test), two-way layout (Friedman test), independence measures (Kendall’s tau, Spearman’s rank correlation), simple linear regression using Theil’s method, comparing two success probabilities (Fisher’s exact test, McNemar’s test), and life distributions (Kaplan–Meier estimator).

Course Management: Course materials and announcements will be managed through **Canvas**.

Course Notes: Lecture slides will be posted as PDF files on the course Canvas page as they become available. Sample R code and data sets will also be provided.

Software: This course will use the statistical software **R**. **R** is open-source and free to use, and no prior coding experience is required. To run **R**, you will need two components:

- **R** – the programming language that performs the statistical analyses.
- **RStudio** – the integrated development environment (IDE) that provides an organized workspace for writing and running R code.

Both programs can be installed at no cost. Installation instructions will be provided in class and on Canvas.
